Cathy and Lakshmi are an important part of Rosenthal Services. We all look forward to our "puppy day", and the enthusiasm Cathy brings. They are a perfect fit!

New Website Offers a Link for Socially Conscious Businesses

Social Purchasing Portal Canada helps businesses connect with individuals who are traditionally under-employed. This is not a charity model. It is a business model. It has been operating successfully in 8 other cities including Vancouver, Calgary, Winnipeg and Toronto. On March 1, 2007 a new branch opened in Ottawa with support from corporate sponsors and the Ontario Trillium Foundation.

Businesses can use this portal to find suppliers of goods and services such as catering, printing, maintenance and courier service at competitive rates.

The Toronto spokesman, Peter Frampton, says there are many benefits to "hiring people with barriers": committed, long-term employees, increased productivity and improved product quality.

St. Paul's University has already signed up and there is hope many of their current suppliers will get on board as well.

Jeff Lindsay was recently interviewed for a CBC TV news report. Jeff is supported by OCAPDD (Community Support Services) and has mild cerebral palsy. He said that there are a lot of people out there trying to find work and he suspects his disability is one reason it took him years to find employment as a dishwasher, despite top marks in his high school food service class and his offer to work free for one week while employers gave him a try. Silver Spring Farm's garlic crop survives wet fall, mild winter, 21.5 inches

The anxiety he and several volunteers associated with the garlic project have been feeling over the last several months has greatly subsided as thousands of tiny garlic sprouts make their way from the lumpy, clay ground in a field off Richmond Road in Bells Corners. "It was a wonderful sight for what we first thought," he says. "Recognizing the weather and the challenges of getting it planted, we are encouraged by what we see."

The garlic crop is the primary fundraiser for the Ottawa-Carleton Association for Persons with Developmental Disabilities. Thousands of dollars are raised each year through the sale of garlic. The crop has become so popular with city residents that volunteers sold the entire crop in eight days last year.

Fraser, the farm's volunteer chairman of the garlic project, had feared there may not be a garlic crop to harvest this year due to a relentless wet fall and a delayed winter. The annual fall planting was delayed three weeks because of the wet weather. Even when volunteers were able to get onto the field, the clay ground was saturated with water, making it extremely difficult to create raise rows and plant the cloves six inches apart.

The weather problems continued to plague the volunteers into the winter as it wasn't until early January that the ground started to freeze, despite no snow. Fraser and other project volunteers worried for months that instead of sprouting, the crop would rot in the less than favourable growing conditions. Now Fraser is hoping that Mother Nature is finally on his side. "We are hoping more will sprout as the ground warms up. We know some didn't sprout because of the wet, wet fall," he says, estimating that 20 per cent of the bulbs may not grow. However, there are still challenges that lay ahead of the volunteers before they sell the garlic, which is known to be juicy and guite tasty. Fraser says it needs to rain at least once a week now until July and be sunny and warm. When July comes, the weather needs to be hot and sunny for optimum garlic growth. And then there is the worry of disease. "In Eastern Ontario, during the last three to four years, many farmers have had the challenges of the leek moth. It has the potential to significantly damage the crop," Fraser says, explaining the moth larvae eat into the garlic cloves. "So far we have been fortunate that our crop has not been significantly affected, but we have to closely monitor it," he says. When the garlic will be ready is anyone's guess. The crop has been known to be ready as early as July 19 and as late as August 19. "Garlic is unique. It can look like it is not ready at all, but in three or four days it has ripened and it is ready to be harvested," Fraser explains.

He hopes garlic scapes, the plant's long, curly seed pods, will be available in middle to late June. Scapes will be sold in Loeb stores in Bells Corners, Nepean on Greenbank Road near Hunt Club Road and in Kanata on March Road. Proceeds of the sale of garlic scapes will go to the association.

Ed Haines, who helped to start the garlic project 11 years ago, isn't surprised that garlic has proven to be popular among local consumers. "Once people taste our garlic I am not surprised at all," he says.



City of Ottawa Civic Appreciation Awards

Each spring, as part of the celebration of National Volunteer Week, the City of Ottawa holds an award ceremony, by invitation, to publicly thank the many volunteers at work in our community.

There are 16 different awards that the City presents. This year OCAPDD nominated Harold Moore for Citizen of the Year in the Senior category. On Monday, May 7, 2007 Harold was the lucky recipient of this award.

To quote Volunteer Canada "Volunteers serve on boards and committees, mentor peers, organize cultural and recreational activities, support the elderly, provide shelter, counsel youth, clean parks, coach teams, read to children, and so much more. Volunteers do the work they do because they believe in causes, equal opportunities, clean, healthy and safe community spaces, active living, and helping others. Volunteers simply aspire to make life better for others and we honour them for doing so".

I cannot think of a better way to sum up Harold Moore. Over thirty-five years of volunteering, Harold has sat on numerous boards and still sits on several. For over two and a half decades he has helped both physically disabled and mentally challenged individuals. For the last 22 years he has worked with the Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation and has been both Harold Moore vice-president and President of the Ottawa Senators branch and Ottawa Renegades branch of the 65 Roses Sports Club. He has fund raised tens of thousands of dollars for this organization.



For ten years Harold worked with young Cystic Fibrosis patients, driving them to appointments. Harold became the main support for one individual whose parents were unable to handle the Cystic Fibrosis problems. He arranged for her wedding, medical treatment and for her funeral in 1997.

Harold has worked with youth through the Youth and Community Services of the Ottawa Kiwanis club and founded the Junior Rough Riders. He serves as a mentor to his grandson who has been a volunteer with OCAPDD for three years now. Both Harold and Dylan spend every Tuesday evening at the Aktion Club, which is a club for the developmentally delayed. This club provides friendship, teaches leadership skills, communication skills and gives our agency's individuals a place where they belong. Harold has also taken on overseeing at least three to four other youth each week who are looking to complete their community hours. Most have long completed their hours but continue on to help Harold. Harold has also made this group self sufficient by obtaining ongoing fundraising dollars.

He is an advocate volunteer for the yearly Breakfast of Champions and is in charge of recruiting all the athletes, 40 in total and obtaining the guest speaker.

He has touched seniors through his work on the board of Abbeyfield House.

Harold basically volunteers seven days a week, one place or the other. He has helped so many and never asks for anything in return. He truly volunteers to make the world and life a better place for everyone. He knows no boundaries.


Come join us for the full event or just for dinner. Our MC is Brad Dryden from "The BEAR's Morning Show" who is sure to make you laugh.

Annual Picnic



President's Report

It has been a busy Board season – and more importantly productive. The Board is well along in a strategic planning exercise lead by member Bonnie Dinning. We are looking at our strengths, weaknesses, values and what opportunities the future may hold. We plan on updating the members on their project at the September AGM.

Charlotte Roy, as chair of the Nominations Committee has recruited a new Board member. We are lucky to have Dr. Susan Farrell join us. Susan is a clinical psychologist working in this sector out of the ROH. She is Head of the Evaluation Research for Community Mental Health and is also a clinical professor in psychology at University of Ottawa. She has a wide range of volunteer experience in a number of provinces and she indicates that she is "passionate about advocating for inclusion" of our clients in society.

On that note of solid recruitment by Charlotte and her committee she does advise me that with the AGM not all that far away additional volunteers will be required for service on the Board. Although it appears that there will be little turnover this year, two spaces will be vacant. With a whole slew of new condos for some of our clients and preparation for more clients from Rideau Regional and the refurbishment of the residences at the farm, it has been a productive and busy period for the staff and Board. In addition, some extra funds are flowing from the provincial coffers to enhance the lives of the folks we work with. It is indeed turning out to be a good year for all those who help, work and reside within the agency.

Executive Director's Report

As you are likely aware, Minister Sorbara announced an increase in funding of \$200 million for the developmental services sector over the next four years. While this appears to be a 'good news story', the sector is awaiting the detailed announcement regarding the allocation of these funds. As mentioned in my last article, and for the first that most people in the sector can recall, there was a strong, coordinated lobbying effort across the Province. The messages were consistent; all stakeholders were represented and involved; and, the MPP's took notice! One of the messages presented, was asking for \$200M as an up-front investment by the Government. A second message was multi-year funding. As you can see, the Government has responded to the requests, but not in the manner hoped for.

You may also have read that Minister Flaherty announced the establishment of Registered Disability Savings Plans in the Federal Budget in March. We are working towards coordinating an information session (in both official languages) in June. Look for more details under "Upcoming Events" in this edition of Esprit.

The Ministry led Transformation Initiative has continued, although there has still not been any release of a formal report. The Ministry has begun generating 'information bulletins' concerning this initiative. These bulletins are being posted on OCAPDD's website, and are also available on the Ministry's website at: <u>www.mcss.gov.on.ca</u>. Information concerning eligibility and application packages is identified in the most recent bulletin.

As you may also be aware, an Operational Review concerning the Access Mechanism in Ottawa was conducted over the past year. While the report was received by the Ministry last summer, it was not released to the public until a couple of months ago. We obtained our copy of the report from the Families Matter Co-Operative's website at: <u>www.familiesmattercoop.ca</u>. There is certainly change occurring in Ottawa as a result of this report, and I would encourage you to review it.

As announced in December, we have embarked upon a complex expansion and renovation plan for OCAPDD and some of our properties. Campbell and undergoing Charette are extensive renovations. and literally have had to be 'gutted' to correct outstanding health and safety issues in order for their renovations to be completed by

this summer. (see pictures) We are working towards welcoming 16 individuals from Rideau Regional Centre over the next several months. The Conservatory Program has now been operating for several months, and hosted an Open House in early May to profile the new accommodations.

While the year-end financial results are in the process of being audited, the preliminary results indicate that OCAPDD finished the fiscal year with a small operating surplus. We also were fortunate to have received a one-time fiscal grant of over \$190,000 from the Minister. The Board of Directors has endorsed Management's recommendations to allocate these funds towards the following priority areas: client outcomes; staff development; health and safety issues; and, minor capital items. Given that these funds will never be received again, their expenditure will be cautiously authorized.

Finally, I would like to draw your attention to another internet based information and support service that I was recently made aware of. That is, CLEONet.ca. While not intending to duplicate the information here, it is a source of information concerning legal rights and practical resource guides to assist low-income and disadvantaged communities in Ontario. As an example, the first guide listed on the site is entitled: *Disability Benefits in Ontario: Who can get them, How to apply.*
