

Peter William Stoddart (April 13, 1955 – December 22, 2007)

Peter Stoddart was born in Thornhill, Ontario. Although he was born with Down's Syndrome and just one good lung he had three older brothers to teach him life skills and to enjoy the fun years of early childhood. With grandparents living nearby in Aurora, Peter was a happy member of a caring family. Parents of others like Peter started "Thornhaven" in Richmond Hill, a school for handicapped children, and Peter was soon enrolled.

When he was ten, Peter and his family moved to Scotch Plains, New Jersey, where his father managed an electronics company. Peter joined a trainable class in the local elementary school. When he was 18, he went to another local school for a workshop training program, then at 21 he started work at the Union County Occupational Centre that had contracts for various New Jersey firms. Peter participated in local events, went on field trips, belonged to a special boys scout troop, sang God Bless America and almost became an American. His friends with Down's Syndrome went into group homes in Scotch Plains. Peter went for a time to Elwyn Institute in the Philadelphia area, but health problems made it too difficult to continue.

When Peter's dad retired in 1978, the family moved to Ottawa, where Peter's oldest brother worked and had a family. Peter joined the Rosenthal Occupational Centre but found the readjustment from life in New Jersey difficult. His brothers had gone off to college and worked elsewhere and Peter was still living at home. From 1986-1989 he was in a training class at Algonquin, but really needed steady routine work and a home away from his parents. Finally an opening at the Loeb workshop became available and Peter was happy there for many years. He moved to Silver Spring Farm when he was 45, living there and more recently with friends at the Ahearn Residence until he died.

On behalf of Peter, we want to thank the many very dedicated members and staff at the Ottawa-Carleton Association for People with Developmental Disabilities and associated organizations for their care and friendship over the years.

The main focus of this project is to assist two individuals in their transition from their family home to independent living. They are now being supported by our Community Support Services (CSS). Part of the success of this proposal was the recognition that families and service agencies can work together to ensure that adults with a developmental disability are able to have a secure future while optimizing their quality of life. One of the many innovative aspects of this project is the development of a "parent to parent" resource on how to prepare family members with a disability for independent living.

Thank you from the Silver Spring Farm Garlic Project

We would like to recognize Simon Arseneault, all the ladies of the Walter Baker Chapter of the IODE and all of OCAPDD's wonderful volunteers and the hundreds of Church volunteers who have given so generously of their time and talent to the SSF project and the gift wrapping project.

For several years the IODE ladies through their fundraising activities have provided the clients and staff of the SSF residences and the Conservatory with Christmas dinner out at a local restaurant. Several of the ladies have also volunteered and assisted with the preparation and selling of the garlic.

Again this year the 16 to 18 young men and women Church missionaries have faithfully and immediately responded to our request for help in removing the straw and a week later place over 1,000ft of irrigation hoses. In previous years the missionaries have also helped with picking the garlic scapes, weeding the garlic, harvesting of the crop and planting the garlic. It's most appropriate to recognize the missionaries for their dedication and commitment to the garlic project and to the gift wrapping project.

Our volunteers are the reason why the project is so successful and every one of their efforts is most appreciated. Your participation is very much appreciated.

Executive Director's Report

One of the most significant events that occurred during the past several months was the release of the Provincial Auditor's Report. In the Report, there was a complete section concerning MCSS' Developmental Services. While the Report did not receive any media coverage, it did make many strong statements and recommendations concerning the lack of controls and accountability systems for the sector. In response to the criticisms, the Ministry stated that "Many of the planned improvements associated with the transformation – such as the establishment of clear eligibility criteria, the introduction of standardized access processes and assessment tools, and the introduction of quality assurance measures – are strongly aligned with the Auditor General's recommendations." This response appears to have indeed re-energized the Transformation Initiative, with the Ministry leading the process. Additionally, it has already led to changes in administrative and management procedures for organizations.

Access to the system remains a significant challenge. As we know, lack of funding and capacity are impediments to service. As part of Transformation, there will be changes made to both the 'access' and 'assessment' components of the system. The Support Intensity Scale is being piloted in several organizations in several regions of the province. Information on this project is available at: <u>www.siswebsite.org/cs/Newsletter/Ontario2007</u>. Other changes are anticipated soon, and will be reported on as they are announced.

The growing wait list in communities across the Province was the major focus of lobbying efforts prior to the recent Provincial Budget. Unfortunately, the Budget was largely silent with respect to the developmental services sector. The one exception was the announced 2% increase to ODSP levels. Obviously this is good news however the actual date for this increase has not been announced.

As noted in the last edition of ESPRIT, the Government did provide the anticipated additional funding to the sector. This funding was directed towards increasing wage levels. Although OCAPDD had a signed 2-year collective agreement ending in 2009, Management and the Union 'opened up' the agreement, and bargained the additional wage increases. These increases were implemented in March; however they were retroactive to April 2007.

OCAPDD is close to the completion of its expansion plan, previously reported on. The Campbell and Charette Programs have been renovated, and most of the individuals have moved from the facilities. The Ministry is indicating that they anticipate Rideau Regional being closed on schedule, or possibly even earlier than March 2009.

OCAPDD has continued with its management agreement of Open Hands in Cornwall. The anticipated decision date regarding a possible amalgamation of Open Hands by the Board of Directors has been pushed back to June, in order to allow for the completion of a business plan.

Two internet based resources that may be of assistance to you, or someone you know are: 'The Guide to Property and Personal Care – for Older Adults with a Developmental Disability'. This guide was developed by the Ontario Partnership on Aging & Developmental Disabilities (OPADD), and is available for free from their website at: <u>www.opadd.on.ca</u>. The second resource is known as ConnectABILITY, and was developed by Community Living Toronto. It can be found at: <u>www.connectability.ca</u>.

The first Silver Spring Farm Award was presented to Jolene Arseneault at the March Board meeting. The announcement of the Award resulted in many strong applications being received from students at all 4 Colleges and Universities in Ottawa. We look forward to the next Award which will occur in October.

As always at this time of year, I would again like to encourage you to join us at this year's golf tournament on June 16th. It is always an enjoyable event.

Registered Disability Savings Plan (RDSP) Update

The Registered Disability Savings Plan (RDSP) is a new Federal Government initiative intended to help parents and others to save for the long-term financial security of a child with a disability.

The RDSP is for you if you are someone who is;

- Eligible for the Disability Tax Credit and is a Canadian resident; OR
- A parent or legal representative of a person who is resident in Canada and is eligible for the Disability Tax Credit.

Contributions can be made until the end of the year in which the beneficiary reaches the age of 59 - the maximum amount over the plan's lifetime being \$200,000.

In addition to your contributions, the government has two programs designed to assist in growing the balance within the RDSP - depending on the net income of the beneficiary's family;

- 1. The government will contribute between 100% to 300% of contributions in Canada Disability Savings Grants up to a maximum of \$3,500.
- 2. The government will also contribute \$1,000 annually in Canada Disability Savings Bonds.

When it comes time to withdraw funds from the plan, only the growth and grant money will be taxed in the beneficiary's hands.

One of the questions that remain is if, or how, these withdrawals (or the fact that there's an RDSP in place) may impact the existing income benefits that the beneficiary already receives. We anticipate such details will be provided when the plan becomes available this year.

Doctors of Shredding

The *Doctors of Shredding* are a dedicated group of OCAPDD staff and ten clients that shred paper at CHEO 5 days a week from 9:30 to 2:30.

The Loeb Centre started the CHEO program in September 1998 with Jill McKnight and two Loeb Centre clients volunteering at CHEO for one morning a week to shred paper. The program grew in scope and size each year. In 2006 Jill negotiated an honorarium for the group, part of which goes to the Loeb Centre and part of which goes to the individuals in the program. As well, in 2007 the program was opened to OCAPDD clients beyond the Loeb Centre

The *Doctors* have their own small office in the basement at CHEO which houses 4 shredding machines that are in constant use. On an average day, the *Doctors* produce 30-35 bags of shred and pickup 8-10 bins of paper. There are 125 bins located throughout the hospital. CHEO is a safe and friendly environment and there is always lots of work and no down-time.

In the future, the *Doctors* would like to have a dedicated, well-ventilated space large enough to house the shredding machines, out of the way of hospital traffic. As well, they would like space for a sorting table and a secure area for the recycle bins.

In 2006 a second CHEO program was undertaken by this group of volunteers. In addition to their shredding operation, they now help out in the CHEO Foundation Office two days a week. They assist with the mailing of tax receipts to CHEO donors – folding, stuffing and stamping envelopes.

The group takes great pride in their ability to volunteer successfully in the community at tasks that are necessary and valued.
