This story begins in March 1988 when Karen offered her home to support Kay. Four months later, Karen opened her home again and Sally became part of her family. By December 1989 Jeff moved in.

In October 2010, 22 years later, Karen Schroeder announced her retirement. Typical of Karen's caring, however, she ensured the three individuals were well taken care of. Kay and Jeff moved in with Karen's daughter, Robin, and her family. Sally had moved earlier where she has become part of another provider's family. Kay, Jeff and Sally have adjusted well and that speaks volumes of the care, the support and the compassion shown by Karen over the years. Part of that care, support and compassion involved accompanying the three sharers to Florida for a few weeks every winter. Disneyland was always the highlight of the trip and Karen never tired of describing the excitement everyone had or of promoting the theme park's wonders. Every summer, the group would spend time at their camp site enjoying the simple pleasure of the outdoors. Christmas is the other inspiration for Karen. As with Disneyland, she never tires of the excitement, the wonder and the inspiration that it offers. She has more Christmas decorations and mechanical figurines than anyone I know. Her face lights up when she displays them and there is great pride in her as she describes how each one works.

We can't forget the role of Karen's family during those years as a provider. We know it can be a challenge at times being a provider but Robin was always there to help her mother and the sharers. Robin played an important part of this process and her importance continues today with her supporting Kay and Jeff.

So with retirement Karen has purchased property in Florida where she spends much of her year. The balance of the year she can be found in Cardinal where she lives in her "Thomas Kincaid" house.

In May of this year, Tom and I visited with Karen to talk to her about her experiences with Homeshare. She was recognized with a plaque and a letter of appreciation from OCAPDD for her years of caring. And to that we add a simple "thank you". It seems hardly enough to recognize 22 years of making a difference in the lives of others. For making a difference in our community. However, a simple thank you is exactly what Karen appreciates. Because that is the type of person she is. She sees her role as a provider as something one does to help others. So thank *you* Karen. Thank *you* for 22 years of support to Kay, Sally and Jeff. Thank *you* for being part of the Homeshare program. Thank *you* for being the caring and the compassionate person *you* are.

#### The Walking Club

The Walking Club has continued since the move to Colonnade. We can be seen cruising Colonnade each day at 10:00 in all types of weather. We have found a route that takes us through a path in a park setting which provides an attractive view of the changing seasons.

#### Silver Spring Farm Garlic Project Update

The garlic project was very successful this year with a near record harvest. This was a great relief after a very disappointing harvest in 2010 due to weather and poor planting conditions. This year's crop had ideal conditions right from the start. The field was kept weed free for the whole year prior to planting. Planting conditions were perfect with many long time volunteers commenting that the soil conditions/rows were the best they had ever seen. Garlic likes 5 to 6 inches of soft soil to grow in and that was what we had. With 80 plus volunteers the planting was done in record time.



Although weeds are always part of farming and requires many hours of volunteer labour, weeds were not as big an issue due to improved farming methods used. The weeding job, although mostly carried out by members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, was augmented by a few individuals from Genband Corporation. The church had additional help this year with 80 young adults from Quebec and Ontario attending a weekend conference in June. They spent Saturday afternoon weeding the entire field. It was quite a site looking at the entire field of garlic free of weeds. Genband sent 30 volunteers for an afternoon and they were able to weed a good part of the field.

The project benefits from donations of funds from a number of individuals to help cover most of our operational costs. Continental Mushroom again donated 2 large loads of mushroom compost that were again delivered free of charge by Burnside Sand and Gravel. This year we purchased 4 additional loads of compost at a discount and all were delivered free of charge by Burnside. This additional compost should help to ensure an even better crop for 2012.

Next year's crop is off to a great start with the additional compost and great soil conditions for planting. The planting was completed in just 2 hours with about 65 volunteers. Spreading of the straw, to protect the garlic for the winter, was completed in late November. This work was completed by a dance troop of girls ages 16 to 18, aided by a few individual volunteers. These girls were amazing working for 3 hours and refusing to leave the field until they checked that every row and every garlic clove was properly covered.

With the continued efforts of all volunteers we look forward to a bigger and better crop next July.

# **RRSP, TFSA, RESP or RDSP?**

The registered disability savings plan (RDSP) should really be the go-to registered vehicle for disabled Canadians and their families to not only enjoy tax-deferred investment compounding but to take advantage of significant government funds available, potentially retroactive to 2008, the year RDSPs were first launched.

The RDSP is a tax-deferred registered savings plan open to Canadians eligible for the disability tax credit. Up to \$200,000 can be invested in the plan. While contributions are not tax-deductable, all earnings and growth accrued are tax-deferred until withdrawn from the plan.

Generally, the most attractive feature of the traditional RRSP, RRIF or TFSA is the ability to earn taxdeferred or tax-free investment income. But assuming the beneficiary's marginal effective tax rate doesn't significantly fluctuate between the time a contribution is made and when the funds are ultimately withdrawn, the main advantage of the RDSP is the ability to supplement the plan with matching Canada Disability Savings Grants (CDSGs) and Canada Disability Savings Bonds (CDSBs) for beneficiaries age 49 and under.

CDSGs and CDSBs are based on family income. If the beneficiary is under 19, it's generally the beneficiary's parents' family income but once he or she reaches 19, it's the beneficiary's own family income that is used to determine the amount of government assistance.

CDSGs are equal to 300% of the first \$500 of annual contributions and 200% on the next \$1,000 for a maximum annual entitlement of \$3,500, subject to a lifetime maximum of \$70,000. If a family income is over \$83,088 the CDSG is simply 100% on the first \$1,000 of annual contributions.

CDSBs of up to \$1,000 annually up to a lifetime maximum of \$20,000 can also be paid into RDSPs for lower-income families who have income below \$24,183. The \$1,000 CDSB is the phased out gradually as income increases above this amount until it's fully eliminated once family income reaches \$41,544.

Note that unlike the CDSG, the CDSB is not a matching amount, meaning that no contributions are required to get up to \$1,000 in CDSBs annually, depending on family income.

This year marks the first time that CDSGs and CDSBs can be collected retroactively based on current contributions, although retroactive payments of this government assistance aren't expected to be paid into RDSPs until sometime in 2012.

As a result, now when an RDSP is opened for a beneficiary for the first time, CDSGs and CDSBs can be received retroactively to 2008 up to an annual maximum of \$10,500 in CDSGs and \$10,000 in CDSBs. And the best news of all is that the CDSGs will be paid first at the highest matching rate (300%, where applicable) and then at the lower rates (200% or 100%, as applicable). Retroactive CDSGs and CDSBs are based on family income in those particular years.

As you are all aware, Dalton McGuinty's Liberal party was re-elected on October  $6^{th}$ . Soon thereafter, John Milloy was announced as the new Minister of Community & Social Services. While he represents a riding in Kitchener, the new Minister does have a connection with Ottawa as he is a graduate of Carleton University, and also worked for a period as Legislative Assistant to Prime Minister Jean Chretien. The Minister has begun making connections with several leaders within the developmental services sector.

Since the last Esprit in the spring, there was also a change within the senior ranks of the Ministry. Alex Bezzina left his position of Assistant Deputy Minister - Operations and assumed an ADM position with the Ministry of Health. As announced in the Annual Report and discussed at the AGM, OCAPDD made a decision to not reapply for any future United Way funding and to no longer participate in any United Way activities or fundraising. To maintain the payroll deduction program for employees that had been put in place for United Way, OCAPDD developed an initiative to allow programs to submit proposals for projects up to \$5,000. A committee made up of several staff members and the Director of Community Resources will review the proposals to select the project(s) to be supported. The announcement will be made in early December so that when employees are asked to continue to make charitable deductions from their pay in 2012, they will know exactly what their donations will go towards supporting. Initial feedback on this initiative has been positive, and we anticipate that it will become an annual activity.

An information session on Quality Assurance Measures was held for families on November 21<sup>st</sup>. There was a very good turnout, with many thoughtful comments, questions and concerns being raised. We would like to thank Rick McInnes, MCSS Program Supervisor for also participating in the meeting. He expressed appreciation to those in attendance for their comments, and indicated that it was important for the Ministry to hear the feedback from families directly.

At the AGM held in September, the following individuals were elected to the Board: Peter van der Jagt, Andi Marcus, Denise Dupuy and Pam Parent. Also at the AGM, we bid fond farewell to Stephen Arbuckle who had reached his maximum term on the Board (8 years), and to Janet Nevala who had resigned. At the Board meeting in October, Bonnie Dinning and Bill Cowie were re-elected President and Vice-President.

Finally, we are looking forward to the 5<sup>th</sup> round of The Silver Spring Farm Scholarship Award being announced in January. We anticipate the next two Award recipients to be announced by March.

On a lighter note, we would like to wish you and your loved ones a safe and joyous holiday season, and look forward to further communication with you in the New Year.
