### **OCAPDD / Open Hands (OH) Satisfaction Survey**

In the spring of 2013, a satisfaction survey was sent to family members of the people we support.

This was the second family survey; the first was in 2010. Below is a brief summary of the results.

General Statistics Related to the Survey to Families	2013	2010
Total Mailed out to Families	530	587
Total Completed	132	194
Percentage Returned	25%	29%
Surveys with Comments	76	95

#### **Areas to Celebrate**

7 questions had over a 95% positive response:

- 1. OCAPDD provides quality services and supports.
- 2. You would recommend OCAPDD to other families.
- 3. They appear to be satisfied with services and supports they are receiving.
- 4. The people that provide the support are accessible to you.
- 5. You are satisfied with the professionalism of the people that support your family member.
- 6. You are satisfied with the compassion and respect being given.
- 7. You are comfortable in communicating with the people that provide support.

#### **Areas to Work On**

6 questions that had the highest rate of negative responses:

- 1. 23% are not well informed of services.
- 2. 19% are not satisfied with the level of community involvement.
- 3. 19% do not have regular contact with people who provide service.
- 4. 18% are not receiving information in a timely fashion.
- 5. 17% are not satisfied of decision making their family member has about their services.
- 6. 17% do not have input into choice of goals.

#### **Outcomes**

- 1. Results were presented at the AGM last September.
- 2. A copy of the Complaint Resolution Mechanism is included in this Esprit Newsletter.
- 3. A family meeting to discuss items such as: core values, ISSP changes, confidentiality, complaints, etc. will be held in the new year.
- 4. All programs have received the survey results and will be working on action plans.
- 5. The next survey will be sent out by email and by mail with the hopes of increasing the number of respondents.

### My Life - My Plan

When I graduated from The Mental Retardation Counsellor (MRC) Program at Algonquin College in 1982, I felt well prepared to 'take care' of individuals who required these services, and to keep them safe from harm and failure. Fast forward a few decades, where my responsibility has evolved into that of an advocate for individuals I support. My role is now to seek and offer options and possible outcomes to issues which arise, and then (and this is scary and a challenge for me sometimes) to teach that they have freedom of choice to live their lives in a way that has meaning to them.

Just as this evolution has been, and will continue to be a process for myself and others who've chosen to work in this profession, it is also a process for the people supported by our agency.

Welcome to **My Life - My Plan**, a program developed by Jill Faber of HSA (Helen Sanderson Associates) with Yvonne Spicer and Theresa Somerton, self-advocates. People working and supported by OCAPDD and Open Hands in Cornwall, have met and have been trained by these women to lead **My Life - My Plan** workshops to small groups of other people working for and people supported by OCAPDD, Open Hands (and occasionally people supported by other agencies in the Ottawa area). People attending these workshops are encouraged to re-think their roles in the yearly **Individual Support Service Plan (ISSP)**; for employees, this means giving up control of directing a person's life in ways they think is best (which is what I was taught to do, back in 1982, when Columbus sailed the ocean blue) and instead encouraging people to be co-pilots or pilots of their own lives, to use their own voices (and self-expression) to work towards goals which empower them to live a life which has meaning to them. Simple, but not always easy, for everyone involved and for the most part, this is because no one wants anything bad to happen to a loved one.

Brené Brown, research professor at the University of Houston Graduate College of Social Work, has observed that "there is no innovation and creativity (in one's life) without failure"; or, as Theresa Somerton, Board Representative at the Provincial Level with Community Living Ontario, asked at this week's meeting: "How many parents and staff are afraid to let the blanket go?" (Me at times!). "I'm not here to take over but to encourage people to find their own voices." Yvonne Spicer sits as Council Representative for All Self-Advocate Groups with Community Living Ontario, and has captured the attention of workshop participants with her stories of struggle and success to achieve goals of meaning to her, including obtaining a driver's license, and living in her own apartment.

Christine Robertson "It's fun and it takes me away from my other job."

**Louise Galloway** "It helps me to think about it when I'm out for the day and have choices to make." **Amanda Nadon** (of Open Hands, Cornwall, ON) "More training is needed for staff and managers because it's not working; they're not listening."

**Robert Concordia** "I like learning something new because we've never done anything like this before, and I like training other people how to use it."

**Jennifer Rodgers** "What I have enjoyed is seeing the trainers gaining confidence and knowledge. They are always so eager to want to meet and are so looking forward to getting it going. They take pride in their work and you can see their self-esteem building through being part of this training."



#### Clarence "Clem" Hamelin (March 9, 1925 - May 7, 2013)



### Silver Spring Farm Garlic Project Update

The garlic harvest for 2013 turned out to be a banner year with record revenues. The bulbs in general were bigger and whiter than past years which resulted in increased revenue.

One might ask why the crop was better this year but this was not the case with many growers. There were several factors in play. There was lots of rain this year and we had to use the soaker hose irrigation system very little. I expect the crop was whiter because we did not use much well water which could be the cause of the discolouration in other years. Because we plant our garlic on raised hills too much moisture was not an issue.

This year we also fallowed the field when not in use, which resulted in fewer weeds. For the 2013 crop, we covered the garlic with straw for the winter and rather than removing the straw in the spring we let the garlic grow through the straw. The straw was a great mulch to hold the moisture in but also held back many of the weeds. The garlic had lots of moisture plus it did not have to compete with the weeds for moisture or nutrients.



The reduced problems with weeds meant we were able to greatly reduce the amount of labour used on this activity. It was only necessary to weed the field twice instead of the normal 4 to 5 times. The project is becoming more and more a committee project with a number of new groups sharing the work load. Although the members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints are still the largest contributor to the work others have come in to reduce the load. Groups like GenBand, TD/MBNA, Algonquin College, Health Canada and Sir Guy Carleton High School made a major contribution this year as did many community volunteers. For the first time, in the 18 years of this

project, the crop was planted this fall by non LDS church members. This is a good sign the project is truly becoming a community project with the many groups ensuring the work gets done and the hope the project will continue for many years to come.

The crop of 2013 was a banner crop but plans are to have 2014 crop bigger and better. With good weather and the help of many this will come to pass.

### **President & Executive Director's Report**

#### **ONTARIO**

Since the last Esprit in the spring, Christine Elliott was able to table a Private Members Bill to create a Select Committee on Developmental Services. This Bill was passed with support from all 3 parties, and while the Committee was originally anticipated to begin its work in the summer it did not get established until early October. The mandate of the Committee; its membership; and, a schedule for its meetings (and locations as they will travel to different communities in the province) can be reviewed at: http://www.ontla.on.ca/web/committee-proceedings/committees\_detail.do?locale=en&detailPage=business&ID=7850 We encourage you to attempt to participate in this process.

In the Spring Ontario Budget, a 1% increase to ODSP was approved. This increase began to flow as of September. Within the Ministry, a new Assistant Deputy Minister position was created that will be solely responsible for Social Assistance and implementing recommendations coming out of the report regarding the reform of Social Assistance in Ontario made by Commissioners the Hon. Frances Lankin and Dr. Munir Sheikh released last October.

#### **OMBUDSMAN**

As we have reported on previously, Ontario's Ombudsman conducted an investigation into the DS sector earlier this year. The investigation phase is now complete, and a Final Report is being prepared. It is anticipated that this will be released in early 2014.

#### OCAPDD SURVEY

We were pleased with the results of the most recent survey conducted by Management. As you will recall, this was the second survey with families of the individuals we support. The results were again overwhelmingly positive, and were presented at the AGM in September. Information from the results is also included in this copy of Esprit for your review.

#### OCAPDD BOARD

At this year's AGM the Board expressed its appreciation to both Rob Kirwan and Frank Arecchi who had reached their maximum term on the Board of 8 years and retired. The membership elected Mike Appleton, Terry Mooney and Norma Lamont to the Board, along with re-electing Bill Cowie and David Keay to another 2-year term.

The Board has just been through its strategic planning exercise and is looking first, to continue work on building consensus and coalitions to advocate for national or federal government support for the disabled including researching information from other jurisdictions. We were fortunate to obtain a Federal Summer Student Grant and hired Jessica McCuaig to work with the Board Committee on this project. Other than this, the Board will also continue to advocate on the seniors issue and other relevant topics facing the organization and sector.

#### INFRASTRUCTURE FUNDS

OCAPDD / Open Hands received Infrastructure Funding from MCSS recently for several projects. Funds were targeted to repair the entrances at the Rosenthal Program; the Loeb Program is having new accessible washrooms being built as well as a new roof, along with repairs to the skylights; and, the Sydney Street Program at Open Hands is having a major renovation. We are very appreciative of this funding and the improvements that will be made to these programs as a result.

#### **FAREWELL TO DANIC**

Recently, after extensive research, Management selected a new client information management database system. 'ETO' (Efforts to Outcomes) was implemented at Open Hands over the past year, as they had no electronic database for client records. It was the intention of ETO being introduced later at OCAPDD to replace Danic. Extensive training sessions were conducted recently by Cheryl Lapointe and Joe Geneau in order to train all of our employees on the new system, and they are to be thanked for their work on this. All feedback has been positive, and the new system will be live in November. While Danic was the best selection available to us when it was purchased in 1999, we have long recognized that it was not a 'user friendly' program.

#### **CHRISTMAS GIFT WRAP**

As always at this time of year, we would like to encourage you to join us by either volunteering at one of our Gift Wrap booths, or coming by to have your presents wrapped by us. As we have for several years, there will be a booth at both the Carlingwood and St. Laurent Shopping Centres.

The Select Committee on Developmental Services will meet to consider the urgent need for a comprehensive developmental services strategy to address the needs of children, youth and adults in Ontario with an intellectual disability or who are dually diagnosed with an intellectual disability and a mental illness, and to coordinate the delivery of developmental programs and services across many provincial ministries in addition to the Ministry of Community and Social Services.

The Committee intends to hold public hearings. Interested people who wish to be considered to make an oral presentation to the Committee should contact the Clerk of the Committee.

Those who do not wish to make an oral presentation but wish to comment may send written submissions to the Clerk of the Committee at the address below.

# Sam Ketchup Steven Timothy

There's an English proverb that says, "A cat has nine lives. For three he plays, for three he strays, and for the last three he stays." And so begins the story of a very lucky stray cat.

Nobody knows where he came from, who owned him or for that matter what his name was. He simply arrived, and never left. Sure, he came and went at will, but inevitably, he'd be back strolling like a King into his kingdom. We were given instructions not to feed him and only visit outside because we didn't have a litter box for him. The staff team tried but Rick had found a friend. He shared food, drink and a warm bed. He christened the cat, "Sam Ketchup". Rick never believed we owned Sam Ketchup nor for that matter adopted him. He simply said, "He adopted us".

And how fateful a statement that turned out to be when Sam Ketchup returned one morning badly injured seeking help. Rick found him dazed, confused, bleeding from the nose and dragging his right front leg across the deck. He came in and told me, "the cat nose bleeding". At first, I didn't understand what Rick said. "The cat's nose is what?" "Bleeding!" We rushed outside and there he was, the King of Beaudry, barely able to walk trying to hide under the deck. I told Rick to stay with him while I called Judy. She arrived to find me out stretched on the ground donning a winter coat in May trying to coax him in the direction of an open dog crate positioned near the corner of the deck with treats inside.



We assessed the situation and began in earnest to strategize. How could we get this traumatized animal into the crate and to a vet quickly? We tried everything but he would not come out. In fact, each attempt seemed to push him farther and farther under the deck. Judy soon found a power drill and to remove deck boards to reach Sam Ketchup - with thunderous sounds above his head, it worked. He moved towards me and I was able to reach him. At that point, the cat simply gave up and went into the crate without incident. Judy rushed the cat to the vet while I worked the phone and raised over \$1,000 toward the vet bill. Our staff team had fallen in love with this stranger and by God, we were going to do whatever it took to save him. Sam Ketchup went into surgery with four legs and emerged with three. The injured leg had to be amputated at cost, a significant savings for an animal we didn't own. He stayed with Dr. Mark Cochran of the West Carleton Animal Clinic for a couple of days then returned to Beaudry. Neither resident resisted the care needed. After some recovery time, the cat, Maggie, Rick and staff returned to see Dr. Cochran for a check up. Maggie baked some delicious chocolate "cat faced" cupcakes to thank the Doctor and his team for helping us.

As time progressed though, Maggie decided Sam Ketchup should have a more dignified name while in her apartment. She called him Steven, after her fiancé.
