National Archives Contract "Sorted Out"

After the decision by Library and Archives to get out of the sorting and disposal business and after years of talks with different federal departments it became clear that the National Archives Program would have to close its doors after 35 years of operation. Fifty individuals and staff would be without work.

A temporary facility on Colonnade Road was secured for our impending move of April 1st where we would work at reinventing/developing a new program.

On March 19th The Ottawa Citizen published an article on our situation which was followed by a feature on the CTV National News, various radio interviews, online articles and letters to the editor. This caught the attention of the government and ultimately the office of Pierre Poilievre, MP for Nepean-Carleton and Minister of Employment and Social Development, who came to our rescue. A five year commitment has been secured, new equipment provided and a far brighter future has resulted.

This wonderful result would not have been possible without the support and drive of our families, advocates, management, staff and our very devoted, hardworking individuals, a few of which have become media celebrities.

President & Executive Director's Report

ONTARIO

Since our last Esprit in the fall, the Ontario Liberals passed their Budget. While no additional funds were announced for the DS Sector, an additional increase of 1% to ODSP rates was approved. Some of the funding announced in last year's Budget was targeted for wage increases for most employees in the Sector. These funds were allocated through a provincial process, and then in turn bargained at local tables. New collective agreements were reached with CUPE in Ottawa, and with OPSEU in Cornwall, with wage increases negotiated for both 2014-2015 & 2015-2016.

MCSS have announced that the wait lists for both Passport & SSAH were eliminated over the past year, with the new funding announced in last year's Budget.

The Ministry has created a Housing Task Force, which has been working since the fall. They have announced a first round of funding for new housing initiatives / proposals.

OMBUDSMAN

Apparently the rumour we mentioned in the Fall Esprit has proved to be just that, as there has still not been a release of the Ombudsman's report from his investigation conducted over two years ago now. We will continue to monitor for this, and will share it with you when able.

NATIONAL COALITION

The Every Canadian Counts initiative has continued to be very successful over the past several months. ECC was incorporated, and now has a Board of Directors. This was despite efforts over two years to avoid this result. At the proverbial '11th hour', and as a result of media coverage, a local MP intervened with the program being maintained. We would like to thank both Minister Poilievre and former Minister Baird for their efforts in this matter. MCSS had also been very supportive of our efforts to make changes to the program.

GREEN THUMBS PROJECT

Open Hands has developed a new partnership with Kozroots Community Empowerment Project. The purpose of Kozroots Community Empowerment Projects (KCEP) is to oversee and collaborate with stakeholders in order to initiate and develop projects, activities, and events that encourage citizen engagement, social entrepreneurs, businesses, not for profits, agencies, organizations, and government to partner for the common good. Open Hands will be part of a pilot called The Green Thumbs Project. Founded by Joseph Geneau and Brenda Norman, Green

Thumbs is a community garden that promotes social inclusion and community participation for youth and adults with developmental disabilities. Green Thumbs is not only about planting; it includes an educational component that teaches the practice of growing and cultivating plants as part of horticulture as well as providing sensory stimulation, fine/gross motor skills, building and fostering relationships, improving self-esteem and empowering individuals to be more independent and play valued roles as active members of their community. The gardeners have already begun the planting process and they have been nourishing and watching their plants grow at the Open Hands head office. Kozroots has donated a section of land in Monkland and beginning June 2, 2015, individuals involved with the project will travel to the farm to transfer their plants and begin planting new crops. The gardeners will be growing tomatoes, turnip, lettuce, bell peppers, cucumbers, onions, cantaloupe, and garlic. All of the crops that are grown are donated back to Open Hands for the individuals to enjoy as fresh produce. The produce is also available for purchase with the proceeds going to Open Hands.

The gardeners will also have the opportunity to sell the fruits of their labour at this year's Garlic Festival taking place in Cornwall on August 30, 2015. The Green Thumbs Project will also provide the opportunity for supported work and paid employment for individuals the involved in the initiative. This is the beginning of an incredible partnership and journey. Everyone at Open Hands gives it two Green Thumbs Up!




Wendy Doucette (February 11, 1970 - April 19, 2015)
